# Spiritual Thought

World War II started in 1939 and ended in 1945. The U.S. did not enter the war until late 1941. At the time, Church leaders were wisely inspired by the Lord to prepare themselves for the hardships of war, long before hostilities began. Then, Apostle Harold B. Lee

spoke in General Conference, in April 1943, about how the Church counseled members to be self-sufficient. He stated this was not new counsel, and quoted President Wilford Woodruff, who in 1894, counseled the Saints to provide for themselves. "We will be preserved in the mountains of Israel in the days of God's judgment. I, therefore, say unto you, my brethren and sisters, prepare for that which is to

come." Elder Lee recounted, how, in 1937 individuals were told to go beyond welfare production and establish their own system of supply and plant gardens. Lastly, Elder Lee repeated counsel from 1942 for Saints to produce essential foodstuffs, or produce something in kind to exchange for food or teach gardening to others who could rent land to plant gardens.



With war raging in Ukraine and the lingering long-term impacts of the worldwide health crisis, it is essential that we revisit the wise counsel and admonitions of church leaders, who have warned us for over 100 years, to be prepared.

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### **Spiritual Insights**

- Preparation, both spiritual and temporal, can dispel fear
- "...if ye are prepared ye shall not fear " (Doctrine and Covenants 38:30).

## **Prepared in the Technological Age**

In a recent interview with former Secretary of Defense and CIA Director Leon Panetta, journalist Ted Koppel asked the following: "When you hear Vladmir Putin warning about consequences the

likes of which the world has never seen before, everyone immediately assumes that he's talking about nuclear warfare. Could he be talking about cyber warfare?"

In his response, Leon Panetta stated, "I don't think there's any question he could be talking about cyber warfare. You know cyber, as a weapon, means that you don't have to deploy your air force or 'boots on the ground'. You can simply sit at a computer and deploy a very sophisticated virus that can take down our electric grid system, take down our financial systems, our government systems, our banking systems."

As Brother Lacy so eloquently stated in his spiritual thought, we are indeed in the midst of a global crisis. Not only are we more technologically advanced than ever before, but (in my opinion) we are also more vulnerable. As the Department of Homeland Security notes, "Increased connectivity of people and devices to the Internet and to each other has created an ever-expanding attack surface that extends throughout the world and into almost every American home. As a result, cyberspace has become the most active threat domain in the world and the most dynamic threat to the Homeland."

Much of our personal data is shared or tracked over the internet and is at risk of being stolen by individuals with nefarious intentions. Unlike the burglar who comes to the house and steals

> money from the mattress, we can be "robbed" blind of our finances, our credit, even our identities - and be oblivious to the fact that it occurred. When someone walks up and takes your belongings, you are (somewhat) attune to the damage that could entail: they stole my money, they stole my license, they have my credit cards, etc. But when a cyberattack occurs, we are - in most cases - totally blind to the extent of

### What can I do to protect myself?

Brother Jason Bowne, a member of the Lee's Summit 3rd Ward and an IT professional, noted the following things individuals can do to keep themselves and their information safe from cyberattacks and data breaches:

- Update software for everything digital (computer, applications, smart plugs, smart home hubs etc..)
  - Not only your computer, drivers, and applications, but 'smart' things in your house connected to your network are very vulnerable to attack and a way to get in your network and do bad stuff
- Ensure you have a good firewall / router in place in your home
  - Firewalls protect your home network and can alert you of new devices on your network so you can stop them from communicating if you don't know what they are etc.
- Where it is available, add multi-factor authentication (MFA) to your online accounts
  - According to Microsoft.com: "You may hear it called "Two-Step Verification" or "Multifactor Authentication" but the good ones all operate off the same principle. When you sign into the account for the first time on a new device or app (like a web browser) you need more than just the username and password. You need a second thing what we call a second "factor" - to prove who you are."
  - Make sure to add MFA for your church accounts as well. Additional assistance

specifically pertaining two-step verification (MFA), sign-in issues, registration issues, and updating your account settings on the church website can be found HERE

- Consider a new email account if you get way too much junk in your email and especially if you are seeing more phishing emails trying to scam you
  - Yes you would have to update many places where your email is, but sometimes an email address you have



had for 10, 20, 30 years is all over the place on the internet and has probably been bought

and sold on the dark web many times

- Get a password manager in place ASAP
  - Lastpass / onepassword then get all your passwords in there and delete the notepad / excel spreadsheet / notes file that has all your passwords in it
  - Invest time to understand how to use them and ensure they are operational on your phone and computer, and you know how to use these
- Don't click on anything that seems strange
  - A bank will not send you a text with a link to verify your account because you have been hacked
  - A bank will not send you an email telling you you have been hacked and to click on a link to change your password
  - Netflix will not send you an email telling you to login and verify your account unless you ask for it

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 Apple is not going to send you an email telling you your purchase of something needs you to login

 \*All of these are scams to get your credentials so they can steal your identity and buy things on your dime, take out loans or open credit cards under your name

### **Be Prepared**

As always, self-reliance and emergency preparedness teach us to be prepared for adversity. In the overview to Emergency Preparedness on the churchofjesuschrist.org website, it states:

Members of the Church have been counseled for many years to be prepared for adversity. Preparation,

both spiritual and temporal, can dispel fear (see Doctrine and Covenants 38:30).

Elder L. Tom Perry taught, "The need for preparation is abundantly clear. The great blessing of being prepared gives us freedom from

fear" ("If Ye Are Prepared Ye Shall Not Fear," Ensign, Nov. 1995, 36).

With the guidance of Church leaders, individuals and families should prepare to be self-reliant in times of personal and widespread tragedy.

We have the ability to protect our personal information and online identities, but we (as individuals) cannot stop а possible cyberattack on government institutions or systems of infrastructure. In an article written in the Harvard Business Review, Stuart Madnick (professor at MIT) stated, "What do we do if the power grid is breached making electric-start backup generators unusable? What's the backup plan for the backup plan? What happens to our food supply? Our water supply? Our sewer systems? Our financial systems? Our economy? Answering these questions requires systems-level thinking about how everything is connected and consideration of the interdependencies. For example, hospitals might have backup generators. But, what about the supply line for refueling? If the refueling stations need electricity to operate pumps, what is the plan?"



As terrifying as all that may sound, remember the words of Elder Perry who counseled, "...being prepared gives us freedom from fear"; but, it is essential to prepare for whatever challenges may come our way. President Spencer W. Kimball taught that we must be "anxiously engaged in a positive program of preparation." It is not enough to hope for the best; we must prepare for it.

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Make sure that you have some cash on hand in the event your banking system suffers a problem, or the local ATM is inoperable. Keep a reserve of food and other supplies that can carry you through a crisis such as clothing and bedding, drinking water, important documents, longer-term supplies of basic food items, medications, first aid supplies, and ways to communicate with family following a disaster. And, as we have seen in the recent past with the COVID-19 needs as we walk in faith and obedience. He has lovingly commanded us to "prepare every needful thing" (see D&C 109:8) so that, should adversity come, we may care for ourselves and our neighbors and support bishops as they care for others.

As Elder L. Tom Perry ironically but eloquently stated in his address almost 30-years ago in the October, 1995, General Conference:

pandemic, our healthcare systems can become overwhelmed when situational issues arise. Obtain first aid training, learn CPR, and/or educate yourself other lifeon saving measures



On a daily basis we witness widely fluctuating inflation; wars; interpersonal conflicts; national disasters: variances in weather conditions; innumerable forces of immorality, crime,

that can hopefully sustain an injured or ill person until definitive care can be procured.

In the opening monologue of the manual *Prepare Every Needful Thing: Family Home Storage,* a message from the First Presidency states:

Our Heavenly Father created this beautiful earth, with all its abundance, for our benefit and use. His purpose is to provide for our and violence; attacks and pressures on the family and individuals; technological advances that make occupations obsolete; and so on. The need for preparation is abundantly clear. The great blessing of being prepared gives us freedom from fear, as guaranteed to us by the Lord in the Doctrine and Covenants: "If ye are prepared ye shall not fear" (D&C 38:30).

# 12 Principles of Self-Reliance


The Lord has declared, "It is my purpose to provide for my saints" (D&C 104:15). This revelation is a promise that the Lord will provide temporal blessings and open the door of self-reliance. He has also declared that "it must needs be done in [His] way" (D&C 104:16). To receive the blessings of self-reliance, we must accept and live the principles of self-reliance, which include the following:
